MINISTER'S LETTER

Prayers and blessings to all members of the Trillium Fraternity.

This past year saw many activities undertaken by dedicated members at all levels of the Franciscan Family. You will find some of these detailed more fully described in the balance of the newsletter. The new National Council adopted measures to ensure that they are able to carry out their ambitious programs adopting the recommendations of the International Fraternity and those of Chapter at Mats. This time around this will also involve making changes to our Regional Statutes to bring them in line with the National and International documents.

Debbie Tessier, our National Minister attended twice at our Regional activities this year. In April she attended at the Local Ministers' conference while in June she spoke at the Franciscan Fest in Orangeville. News of these events travelled internationally. The support of Dr. Simone's mission to the poor [Canadian Food for Children] by our local Fraternities also received international recognition as part of the Franciscan Active Presence in the World program. As Secular Franciscans we thank the members of the National Fraternity for initiating a newsletter starting with the October 2012 issue. Our dear brother Deacon Maurice Prindiville offs has agreed to be the publisher once again. Thank you Maurice. The region identified all eight Local Fraternities without canonical charter owing perhaps to loss of documents. Working with Fr. Peter Knaapen ofm conv. we hope to provide them with an authentication of the charter in the near future. We are fortunate in that we were able to establish the existence of the related documentation in a number of cases and this should help complete this undertaking.

Following discussions by regional Council we have worked with local Fraternities for the complete



and comprehensive review of the regional membership. This undertaking is progressing well. In the course of this review we learned sadly of the passing of a number of our dear brothers and sisters. We also learned of the sizeable number of members who became residence-bound in this past year but on whose prayers we rely for strength.

The Regional Council members and our Spiritual Assistant continue to make regular visits to local fraternities for purposes of fellowship, to assist with elections, conduct formal reviews in keeping with the requirements of the General Constitution, to review the progress of the Fraternities and to offer support with both local and regional issues. The welcome we continue to receive from all Fraternities is most appreciated. It reminds us all that we are truly one large family of Sts. Francis and Clare.

Nationally and regionally we continue to be challenged by the decline in membership numbers. This is nowhere more pronounced than in our sister regions in Quebec. As a result we ask all to pray to the Lord for more new candidates and to work towards reinvigorating the local recruitment programs. This may also mean revisiting our plans to ensure both adequate attention to our responsibilities and to do so within our means.

The Regional Council is grateful for your prayers and support.

YOUTH COORDINATOR

Dear Franciscan Brothers and Sisters,

What an exciting time to be a living member of our Roman Catholic Church in this Year of Faith! The focus at the recent Synod of Bishops in Rome was the call to the New Evangelization. I hear this call as the same message that Jesus gave Francis from the cross: "Go rebuild my Church!" I would like to look at media as an effective tool and method for evangelizing and therefore for rebuilding our Church—especially young adults.

1) Blogs:

Here is an atheist who converted to Catholicism and says that "*Bloggng and other new media played a big part in my conversion.*" Her witness can be found at www.conversiondiary.com. When reflecting on St. Francis' call she writes: "*Let's contrast the way St. Francis responded to that message to the way someone like me would heed the same call: Francis: [Gets up, walks out of the church, and gets to work gathering stones.]*"

Jen: "*'Rebuild my church'? What church? This one? Or did you mean my home parish church? And what did you mean by 'rebuild' — are we talking a sym-*



bold spiritual renewal or physical renovation? If the latter, exterior or interior? Or both? Or, wait...did you mean capital-C Church?!" Basically, I would have analyzed it, thought about it, talked about it, and done whatever the 12th Century version of blogging about it was. And I would have taken no action until I felt like I had perfect clarity on it — which means I probably never would have done anything at all."

2) Catholic Podcasts:

The USA is far advanced when it comes to apologetics through media. Catholic Café podcasts where Deacon Jeff interviews a variety of people including the Friars of the Renewal on different topics such as "Why the New Evangelization?," "The Keys to Joy", "You Are What You Eat", to name a few. You can download these for FREE on your ipod, phone or access them on your computer.

Another podcast I have discovered is ChristLife: We Have Been Sent. Young Adults, on fire for Jesus, are equipped for the New Evangelization by running each episode. Relaxed, informative and inspiring!!

3) FACEBOOK:

Social networking is where youth live, move and have their being! People search for topics they are interested in so they can meet people of like-mind!

Our new closed group page will come up if people are searching any of the following words: *Catholic Franciscan Young Adults Youfra Ontario, Canada*. As administrator I invite people to the page or people can ask to join the group. It is an easy way to inform and reach many people. I will post something weekly so that it stays fresh and there is always something new to witness to Franciscan spirituality. Another plus is that it can stimulate discussion. Please suggest young adults for me to invite. Jesus invites us, so too must we invite.

Catholic Franciscan Young Adults YouFra is an open facebook page from Kennebunkport, Maine as is our *YOUFRA CANADA* page.

4) Catholic television & live streaming: As Canadians, we are blessed to have Salt and Light Catholic Media Foundation, which employs many young adults to produce their programs. The "In Your Faith" season 1 and season 2 use Teens and Young Adults to discuss basic Catholic Christian topics. They always have a witness-a COOLCATH- who is an older Catholic who is living out the Gospel life.

"The Church Alive" is a new program presented by Young Adults and very inspiring. The Perspectives weekly program allows people to voice their thoughts for one week prior to filming the episode. The final word is given to the One who is the Word! Check out their APP and FACEBOOK page.

5) YOUTUBE: As we approach All Saints Day I must share a fun video called *The Saint Song*. Don't blink or you'll miss St. Francis & St. Clare!! Also, check out Matt Maher's *Litany of the Saints* - reverent and contemporary!

Communication is a key element to spreading the Good News and though I believe that personal witness is best, media runs a close second!

In the final address at the Synod, the Bishops said, "*The youth are particularly dear to us...because we sense in our youth deep aspirations for authenticity, truth, freedom, and generosity, to which we are convinced that the adequate response is Christ.*"

Peter Murphy from the USCCB's Secretariat of Evangelization and Catechesis says, "*It is a time to stop, reflect, and reconnect to our passion for the Catholic faith in order to become effective evangelists.*" How true! Youthful Francis was passionate. We, the very saints called to bring the good news of the free gift of salvation to anyone God puts in our path, need to be passionate!!

A Letter from St. Francis to St. Clare (Winter 1224)

My Dear Sister Clare,

How kind of you to ask how you can help the brothers in Assisi prepare for Christmas while I am away preaching in the country.

I know there is much to be done. Food must be prepared for the many brothers and sisters who will return from their work to celebrate the feast with us. And food must be prepared to share with poor. The townspeople will expect us to arrange another manger scene and Midnight Mass. We must locate animals and torches, even a baby! We must find a priest for Mass and deacons to assist.

You know that in my heart Christmas, the feast of love, is my favourite Feast – the one I wish would never end. It is the time when the poor should be treated royally, and the animals are not only welcome but necessary to our worship.

But, dear Sister Clare, do not let yourself or anyone of us get caught up in the busyness. That is false preparation for the great Christmas feast. God would have us prepare quietly, in our hearts and in our living.

We must pray and wait for the Incarnation but be prepared for it at every moment. Look at the faces of the lonely and befriend them. See Jesus in the hungry and feed them. Put seeds on the roads for the birds. And stop to thank God for the beauty of the moon on a cold dark night.

This is how to prepare for Christmas.

WHAT IS FORMATION – WHO ARE THE FORMATORS

Formation is not academia

Formation is not culture: it creates it.

Formation is not more or less impersonal conferences

Formation is not just “materials”, paper or audiovisual documentation

Formation is not a series of common places made up of devotionism

Formation is not catechism. It presupposes it.

Formation is to give a new form, the form of Christ, *the perfect man*, according to God’s plan for each one of us: His vocation for us.

Formation is the *compelling*, living transmission of **faith, the personal discovery of God** Who transformed us into new creatures (if we have accepted to be transformed), **the truths which have opened our eyes and have given immediate and ultimate sense to our life, the beauty and joy of our common vocation**, of the compelling ardor to fulfill God’s project for us.

Franciscan formation is to give form to all this, according to the vocation God has given us (which is Grace) to follow Christ as Saint Francis did.

Francis himself is a privileged and paradigmatic icon of formation.

He strove all his life to fully conform to Christ. He followed the only valid method, the only goal, of Christian formation: *sequela Christi*, the following of Christ. He fulfilled his journey in an admirable manner to the point of receiving God’s seal in sharing Jesus’ wounds. The Church recognized him as *alter Christus*, another Christ.



Christ is the Book of life, Christ is our “manual of formation”, the living and true Jesus with His words, His actions, His total donation of self, with His Spirit. He is the Way, the Truth and the Life.

The most efficacious and credible manual also for us Secular Franciscans cannot but be a living manual after the example of Francis who said: *I have done my part, Christ will teach you yours.*

Each one of us, by letting Christ teach us our part, will have to become a “living manual” for his brethren. The flame, the warmth of love and faith can be transmitted only by those who possess this flame, this warmth.

The flame and this warmth can be received only by **those who yearn for them and remain open and accessible to the action of the Spirit**, to the living transmission of authentic and credible “witnesses”.

When all this is accomplished, then, and only then, manuals become useful.

After having received the flame, the enthusiasm, the vital energy and the necessary nourishment also for the intellect, we can retrace in the manuals the living experience we have received, to imprint it in us, interiorize it, assimilate it and become living witnesses and efficacious formators.

This is what happened with the first disciples, with the first Christians who did set the world on fire, while, now, we ... risk to extinguish it!

Francis, like a new Christ, inflamed his companions, his fellow citizens, the men of his own time, and continues to inflame the world, just like the first disciples.

Now it is our turn. We, too, must set the world on fire, my brothers and sisters, and in order to do so we need, *right faith, certain hope, perfect love, profound humility*, just as Francis asked the Crucifix after He had revealed to him his mission. We must multiply ourselves, brothers and sisters, and *by vital contact*, by our presence, we must transmit, form and set on fire.

There are no other methods; there are no other “sophisticated” contents.

Let us pray the Lord to grant us His light and Grace and to teach us our way and help us to embrace it and walk along it in perfect joy all the way to the end.

CANONIZATIONS

Pope Benedict XVI canonized seven saints on October 21, 2012. Doug Clorey, International Vice Minister, attended and sends these words:

I was pleased to have been able to attend the canonization ceremony. For Canadian Secular Franciscans, three of the seven individuals being canonized are particularly relevant. Anna Schaeffer, from Germany, was a Secular Franciscan. Marianne Cope was a Franciscan sister from Syracuse, NY who followed the Third Order Regular and, of course, Kateri Tekakwitha was the first Native American saint, linked to both the US and Canada.

Saint Anna Schäffer, ofs 1882-1925

The life of Holy Anna Schäffer singularly illustrates the following observation by the blessed John Paul II.

"In whatever form, suffering seems to be, and is, almost inseparable from man's earthly existence... Human suffering evokes compassion; it also evokes respect, and in its own way it intimates. For in suffering is contained the greatness of a specific mystery... Down through the centuries and generations it has been seen that in suffering there is concealed a particular power that draws a person interiorly close to Christ, a special grace." (Apostolic Letter *Salvifici doloris*, SD, John Paul II, February 11, 1984 nos. 3, 4, 26).



Saint Marianne Cope O.S.F. 1838 -1918

Saint Marianne Cope O.S.F. arrived in Hawaii, from New York in 1883 to care for leprosy patients on Molokai Island where Hawaii governments had been forcibly exiling them for decades. At the time, there was widespread fear of the disfiguring disease. She led a band of Franciscan nuns to the peninsula to care for the patients, just as Saint Damien, a Belgian priest, did in 1873.

Pope Benedict XVI in his homily at her canonization said, *"At a time when little could be done for those suffering from this terrible disease, Marianne Cope showed the highest love, courage and enthusiasm. She is a shining and energetic example of the best of the tradition of Catholic nursing sisters and of the spirit of her beloved St. Francis."*



Saint Kateri Tekekwitha 1656 - 1680

Known as the *"Lily of the Mohawks,"* Kateri was born in 1656 to a pagan Iroquois father and an Algonquin Christian mother. Her parents and only brother died when she was 4 during a smallpox epidemic that left her badly scarred and with impaired eyesight. She went to live with her uncle, a Mohawk, and was baptized Catholic by Jesuit missionaries. But she was ostracized and persecuted by other natives for her faith, and she died in what is now Canada when she was 24.

Speaking in English and French, in honor of Kateri's Canadian ties, Benedict noted how unusual it was in Kateri's culture for her to choose to devote herself to her Catholic faith.

"May her example help us to live where we are, loving Jesus without denying who we are. Saint Kateri, protectress of Canada and the first Native American saint, we entrust you to the renewal of the faith in the first nations and in all of North America!" (Pope Benedict XVI, speaking at her canonization)
